They also help people in developing countries get clean water.

Hayato: Clean water?

Ms. Wells: Yes. In developing countries, there are some children who can't go to school

because they have to get clean water for their families. They carry \*buckets and

walk many \*miles to the river and bring back water. They do that from morning

until night.

Lucy: Oh, if those children can get clean water easily, they may be able to go to school.

Ms. Wells: That's right. Other things also need to be changed, but \*supplying clean water

to those \*areas is very important.

Hayato: Now I know that I am \*lucky to be able to go to school.

Ms. Wells: Good point, Hayato.

countries to teach. I want to show them that it is fun to learn something.
